Katie grew up on her family farm in North Central Iowa, where her family raised a herd of 25 commercial red angus cows. She was an active 4-H member and showed cattle and horses at her county fair. She was awarded the top Senior Showmanship honor by her 8th grade year, raised many top 10 rate of gain animals and a Champion Cow-Calf.

Katie and her husband Kyle lived in Texas for 9 years and moved back to Iowa in 2018 with two goals in mind. First, to raise their kids (Harper - 5, Tate - 3) closer to family. Second, to purchase an acreage where they could start their own cattle operation. After much research and consideration, they decided they did not want to join the local club calf conglomerate and dove head-first into the Highland world. They started Glory Oaks Farm and had their first calves born on the farm in 2020.

The ranch started out with three Scottish Highlands purchased near Cannon Falls, MN. The ranch now has over 100 highlands, which includes bulls, feeder steers, heifers, cows, and calves. The ranch is located in Northern Minnesota approximately 20 miles from the Canadian border. Our highlands are raised for both breeding stock and beef. I have been a member of AHCA and NCHCA since 2012, I enjoy the friendship and camaraderie of both associations.

### **Fran Wilkinson Buck Creek Farm**

My husband Cal and I are retired from our jobs. He in 2012 and myself in 2014. He worked at Viking Cue in Madison for 37 years. I was worked in the IT department at FABCO Equipment, the Caterpillar dealer for Wisconsin and the Michigan UP for 43 years.

In 2000 we bought my family farm from my parents and started Buck Creek Farm. It's 156 acres. We raise corn, beans and hay and our Highlands.
